Thanks for your response,

The criteria is clear for the scheme and anything that is done by the handymen should not be considered for the scheme.

Having spoke to a facilitator for the scheme in Manchester I considered it appropriate on two fronts for CW12.

- 1. The justice in the community angle as people do like to see justice done, rather than a slap on the wrist.
- Lowest cost application/cost saving .

If the work is of an unsatisfactory level I guess that we/you as the applicant must specify what is the standard to which we/you want the task completed specifically. The old Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic and Timed (SMART) principle to project management and task setting. I only ever envisaged the scheme to be used on longer term objectives rather than ones with immediate requirements.

I would still like to see the scheme adopted and would encourage some debate on the matter at the appropriate Council Meeting. I know its not a fix for all ,but it exists and exists for a very good reason and I believe should be a route to complete tasks when applicable and appropriate.

Therefore can I suggest each councillor comes along with a longer term task(s) they feel would meet criteria (via their good contacts with community groups, churches, schools etc.) and then that application is then submitted.

Then a time scale of actions versus applications could be put together and we have an ongoing program of continuous improvement in the community .

Would be a really nice page on the town council web site with timelines for each successful application!

During our last Finance and Policy meeting we considered an application from St Peter's Church and it was suggested that we should try the Community Payback Scheme before providing a grant

The difficulty with this was twofold:-

- 1. The scheme is not particularly responsive at they have to assess the merit of the application and carryout some basic health and Safety checks first
- 2. St Peter's have used the scheme before and were very unimpressed with the quality of the work and needed to get this job done

The scheme does have merits though and we will try and use it where appropriate, but, many of the jobs that we tackle through our Handymen Service are urgent and the public want us to eradicate the problem quickly which is what we try and do.

Question for Congleton Town Council.

Rather than the Council spend large amounts of funding on tidy up jobs and graffiti removal i.e £1200.00 on St. Peter's Churchyard although it is well spent can I ask that the Council makes its first port of call the Community Payback scheme run by the Probation Service nationally.

Every year across the country local communities benefit from over 5 million hours of community payback work carried out by offenders under probation supervision.

In Greater Manchester alone over 600,000 hours are completed by offenders annually.

This work often goes unnoticed, but the public of Congleton can play a greater part in deciding on the kind of work they would like to see offenders carry out.

If you have a scheme or project which you think would be suitable as a Community Payback project, all the council has to do is complete a nomination form. The Council can even take nominations via its web site.

Projects undertaken by offenders that have been of benefit to local communities include; litter clearance, graffiti removal, repairing and redecorating community centres and environmental work such as maintaining public open spaces and churchyards. Offenders usually work as part of a team, monitored by a supervisor. There are some opportunities for individual placements.

All projects combine hard work and the chance for the offender to develop important life skills. They help to reduce the risk of re-offending and so make our communities safer. It is also a punishment as the offender is giving up their freedom

to carry out work which pays back the community for their crime. Offenders must wear orange high-visibility jackets, marked **Community Payback**, so that the public can see what offenders are doing to pay back.

Community Payback - Project Criteria

I want Congleton residents to nominate the projects that they would like to see carried out. Community Pay Back offer a nomination process and encourage individuals, faith groups, businesses, voluntary groups and local authorities to nominate projects. Once the work has been completed, a plaque may be displayed with the Community Payback logo. This will indicate where offenders have positively contributed to improving a neighbourhood.

To be considered, a project must meet the following criteria:

- It must reduce the fear of crime by making the community safer.
- It must benefit the local community.
- It must not take paid work away from others.
- No one must make a profit from the work.
- It must be worthwhile, constructive and improve offenders' skills.
- Offenders must be seen to be positively contributing to the local community.
- It must take a minimum of 8 people.


I encourage the Council to adopt this as its first port of call for Community Clearup projects.

PUBLIC TRANSPORT CONSULTATION 27 APRIL - 22 JUNE 2012

You may be aware of the Public Transport Consultation currently taking place in Cheshire East. The Council spends around £2.2 million each year supporting bus services throughout the Borough for routes that are not run on a commercial basis. Changes in central government funding have led the Council to look carefully at its budgets - to manage the balance between delivering key services to our customers, and reviewing the allocation of funding for non-statutory services. The support we offer in the form of direct financial subsidies for some public transport services is not immune to these pressures: put simply, Cheshire East Council is seeking to reduce the amount it spends on public transport subsidy.

This consultation is being brought to your attention as some of the services currently supported by Cheshire East Council may operate within your Town or Parish. The financial challenge we are facing affects Cheshire East, your Council and our residents and we believe that we can best meet this challenge by working together to identify where there may be ways to continue to meet the transport needs of residents, but in a more financially sustainable way. We would welcome your assistance with promoting the consultation both to the Members of your Council and also more widely in your local area, particularly if it results in suggestions as to how the Council can prioritise service provision and best meet community needs in the future. The consultation is running until **Friday 22 June 2012.**

You will see from the documentation attached that the Council is suggesting a number of proposals in relation to Supported Bus Services, Flexible Transport and Community Transport and before any key decisions can be made, it is essential for us to consider the impact at a local level. This consultation provides the opportunity for local people and partner organisations to 'have your say' either by completion of an online survey or by attending one of our 'drop in' sessions where officers will be available to discuss local transport needs and record any feedback and alternative suggestions to the current proposals.



PUBLIC TRANSPORT CONSULTATION

27 APRIL - 22 JUNE 2012

1. INTRODUCTION

The recent changes in central government allocation of funding have increased pressure on local authority budgets and the funding available to support public transport. The Council's Business Plan 2012-15 includes a saving of £500,000 in the support for local bus services, which represents an 18% reduction in funding.

The challenge is how best to meet the transport needs of local communities within the context of reduced budgets. The Council is still committed to spending £1.7 million per year on supporting public transport and through this consultation we would like you to contribute your views on how this funding is spent in future.

The purpose of the consultation is to review <u>all</u> the public transport services supported by the Council to understand the impact if any of these services were changed, provided in a different way, or no longer existed. As a starting point, the Council has identified bus services that it currently subsidises that are either not well used, are relatively expensive or otherwise do not meet the needs of residents. The services have been compared with a list of strategic issues that the Council has established to try to rank its support. We are seeking the views of all bus passengers on how these proposals impact on their travel needs.

In addition, there are suggested ways to provide transport in different ways, such as by offering pre-bookable / demand responsive services. These are known by different names (dial-a-ride, ring-and-ride, flexible transport) but all share common features — they have to be pre-booked, they often operate only at specific times or on specific days, and seek to provide transport to meet essential needs (so only visit the nearest suitable town centre).

Finally, there are highly local transport solutions, often provided by volunteers, but sometimes requiring an element of subsidy or other funding in order to be sustainable. Such local provision is by its nature dependent on local voluntary sector organisations, individuals, and carers / friends / neighbours. The Council believes that by devoting a small amount of increased funding to such organisations there will be significant benefits from increasing the number of volunteers able to help fellow residents.

The consultation is therefore centred on 3 different types of transport provision:

- 1. Supported Bus Services: operates to a regular fixed route timetable
- 2. Flexible Transport: operates "on demand" through a telephone booking system
- 3. Community Transport: voluntary sector schemes tailored to local needs

Our approach is to be open and transparent about our proposals. The consultation provides the opportunity for local people and partner organisations to 'have your say' on how the Council should support public transport in future.

Please take the time to read through the Council's proposals below and remember to feedback any comments during the consultation period: **27 April – 22 June 2012**.

2. OUR PROPOSALS

Supported Bus Services

The majority (90%) of bus services in Cheshire East are operated commercially by local bus operators without needing any subsidy from the Council. **These services are therefore unaffected by our proposals.**

The bus services which are the subject of this consultation are those which receive funding from the Council, which is approximately 10% of the bus network in Cheshire East. These services receive support because they are not commercially viable (there are insufficient revenues to cover the cost of operating without subsidy).

The Council currently spends £2.2 million on supporting local bus services which operate to regular, fixed route timetables. The list of supported bus services is shown below:

Please note that pupils who are travelling on services that could be affected by the review and who are entitled to free or assisted transport to/from school in accordance with the Council's Home to School Transport Policy, will be re-allocated to an alternative service or provision if the route becomes affected by any future decisions.

Proposals:

The current level of subsidy is no longer affordable and the Council is seeking to reduce support for fixed route bus services by £500,000. To achieve this saving, we are exploring the following options:

- Reduce the number of days that the bus service is operating
 For example, a bus service that currently is supported to operate each day of the
 week would be supported on only weekdays, or instead of each weekday would
 operate one or two days a week.
- Reduce the frequency or hours of operation
 For example, a bus service currently supported to operate every half-hour would be supported to operate every hour, or early morning or evening journeys would be reduced.
- Withdraw evening journeys
 No services after 18.00 would be supported.
- Withdraw weekend journeys
 No services after 18.00 Friday to 06.00 Monday would be supported.
- Replace the fixed route bus service with a flexible transport service
 For example, whilst a timetabled service might no longer be supported, a pre-bookable, demand responsive service would be supported for essential journeys.

We know that each of these proposals to change the bus services will affect many local residents, and before any decisions are made, we would like to seek your views on what impact these proposals will have on local communities and partner organisations. Please complete Section B of the questionnaire – the results will inform future decisions.

Flexible Transport

There is currently limited flexible transport provision across the borough. The Council supports some services – available primarily for residents with physical disabilities – in the south of the borough. In April 2012, a pilot flexible transport service was launched in the north of the borough that is available to the general public. The purpose of both these types of services is to provide access to the nearest town for essential facilities and services, such as basic shopping needs, accessing healthcare and social facilities, banking and financial services, etc.

It is recognised that — should the proposals for reductions in subsidy for public transport outlined above be implemented — there may be adverse impacts on the ability of some residents to access local services. Whilst not a replacement for public transport, flexible transport services such as ring-and-ride can meet some transport needs that otherwise would not be met. This is especially the case for residents who might have difficulty using public transport due to physical disability, do not have public transport available in the local area, or may need special assistance with occasional journeys (e.g. to and from health care appointments).

Working with Cheshire Community Action, the Council has carried out a mapping exercise of all transport provision across the borough. This has revealed a number of rural areas which currently have <u>no</u> access to any type of transport provision (i.e. fixed route, flexible or community transport). This is an issue the Council is seeking to address through the proposals below.

Proposals:

Our proposal is to expand the flexible transport network across the whole of the Cheshire East area. This could be achieved by zoning the borough into a number of operating areas (for example 6) and ensuring that each area has access to a flexible transport service on at least one day per week. This would provide fair and equitable access borough-wide to a limited service for transport to the nearest town or village, intended to be on a weekly basis. The service would operate on a pre-booked basis using a telephone booking system.

The Council is prevented by law from subsidising transport where there is existing commercial provision that meets the needs of users. It is therefore intended that flexible transport would be aimed at disabled residents and others who either find it impossible to use public transport, or where there is no suitable public transport in the area. It is therefore proposed that some form of application process would be necessary for people to prove their entitlement to flexible transport.

The advantage of this type of service is that it can provide a demand responsive, personalised, door-to-door service. The disadvantage is that access is limited to 1 or 2 days per week and would only provide access to the nearest town or village, not a choice of destination. These types of services can also operate as "feeder" services to the core fixed route bus network and to rail stations.

Community Transport

Community transport takes various forms — but includes any local transport scheme operated by the voluntary sector or by individuals as a not-for-profit transport service. Historically, the majority of the Council's funding to support community transport has been directed at only a limited number of charitable organisations to provide demand responsive transport services. The Council wishes to expand the number of local organisations it supports, particularly those that are seeking to recruit more volunteers, and those seeking to establish and operate voluntary car schemes, Shopmobility scooter loan schemes, etc.

There are many examples across the Cheshire East area of voluntary car schemes – such as "good neighbour" car schemes, hospital cars etc – which are tailored to local needs and provide community-led solutions to transport problems. The Council is keen to encourage, nurture and support these grassroots initiatives where possible and appropriate, recognising the limitations of volunteer based schemes.

Proposals:

Our proposal is to be more proactive in working with the whole community and voluntary sector to encourage, nurture and support community transport schemes and initiatives. The aim is to work with a wider range of organisations and community groups and seek to match up demand for transport with potential supply through a voluntary scheme.

The proposal is to pump-prime innovation and new ideas put forward by local people to meet local needs. The Council seeks to support this work with advice, guidance and financial contributions towards the "back office" booking systems etc. In addition, the Council proposes to investigate subsidising the contributions made by passengers to the volunteer drivers (or to the organisation arranging the transport). The Council would be seeking to work with the sector to prepare Business Plans demonstrating how the initiatives would become financially sustainable and ensure maximum value for money for any taxpayer support granted to voluntary organisations and community groups.

 Healthwatch England, part of the CQC, and Local
 Healthwatch will be established in October 2012 as part of the implementation of the Health and Social Care Act 2012.

 CEC dedicated officers are working with a Local Healthwatch Steering Group whose members include representatives from the CCGs; Health; Cheshire East Local Involvement Network (CELINK); the Voluntary Sector.

What is Healthwatch?



- Healthwatch is a new organisation to be set up by Local Authorities
- It will replace LINk, taking on the same as well as additional responsibilities
- It will officially take on its role April 2013

- •Establishing a Local HealthWatch is a statutory obligation placed on Cheshire East Council.
- *Local HealthWatch will replace the current function of the Local Involvement Networks (LINks) by developing and extending their role as the consumer champion for both health and adult social care.
- •They will start in shadow form from October 2012 and will support people to speak out and they can give those who want to get more involved the opportunity to do so.
- *LINks are community-based, locally accountable networks of individuals, groups and organisations designed to strengthen the patient, public and user voice in the commissioning, provision and scrutiny of local health services.
- •Healthwatch will build on the strengths of the current system, address its weaknesses, and take on additional functions, recognising in particular that it will be in the interest of all partners, including the local authority, that local Healthwatch is able to operate independently and represent the voice of local people in the strengthened system of strategic needs assessment and commissioning decision-making.

What will Healthwatch do?



- Provide information and advice to the public on health & social care
- Monitor and listen to the views of the public on health & social care
- Influence the way health & social care services are provided in the future.

Healthwatch Set Up



- Healthwatch will be a standalone organisation - a social enterprise
- It will be supported by a not for individual profit organisation which we will procure
- It will need to be cost effective, unique and representative of the community

EXAMPLES-

Single supplier

- •A local independent organisation (for example, CAB, CIL, CVS, local social enterprise) could offer to provide all the HealthWatch services in its area as a natural extension of its existing remit.
- •A group of local people (for example existing LINKs members) could set up a local independent organisation to offer all the HealthWatch services in their area. This could be a charity or a community interest company.

Multiple suppliers

•The local authority could divide the HealthWatch functions into two or three contracts and commission each separately from independent suppliers, requiring each to operate a service under the HealthWatch brand, and each to collaborate with the other

Franchised supplier

- •A regional or national body could offer to provide HealthWatch services in a locality they would need to have a distinct local identity, so that people could relate to them; the regional or national body could provide expertise and infrastructure, but there would need to be local management of the work plan. The 'host' body could be a charity, a social enterprise, a private sector organisation.
- •However, CEC can define what sort of organisation it wants to deliver Healthwatch through your feedback.

Setting up Healthwatch



- There is a lot of scope for determining how Healthwatch meets its duties
- We are consulting to find out how it can meet local need:
 - o2 stakeholder events
 - Questionnaire
 - ofocus groups with 'harder to reach groups'
- We need you to be involved in this!

- the duties on services-providers to respond to reports and recommendations made by local Healthwatch;
- the duties on services-providers to allow entry to authorised representatives of local Healthwatch;
- the duty on local Healthwatch to refer matters to local authority overview and scrutiny committees and to the CQC as part of HealthWatch England.

Next Steps



- Consultation will allow us to write a specification for the Healthwatch
- Aim to have a shadow Healthwatch set up in October 2012.

- play an integral role in the preparation of the statutory Joint Strategic Needs Assessment and joint health and wellbeing strategy on which local commissioning decisions will be based;
- have real influence with commissioners, providers, regulators and Healthwatch England using their knowledge of what matters to local people; and
- support individuals to access information and independent advocacy if they need help to complain about NHS services.

Model One – A Membership which elects a Board			
In this model, a Healthwatch board would be <u>elected</u> by Healthwatch Members. This board would help determine the work Healthwatch should concentrate on. This has the advantage that it is democratic. However, the risk is that the people who are elected may only reflect a small section of the Cheshire East community e.g. no young person may be elected and no one from an ethnic minority.			
Model Two – Appointed Board			
In this model, no elections would occur instead people would <u>apply</u> to be on the Healthwatch Board. Candidates would then be chosen by an independent selection panel on the basis of their skills and experience. The advantage of this is that it would be possible to ensure the Board reflects the makeup of the community and has the right skills. The downside would be that it wouldn't be democratically elected.
