



We are very fortunate to have organisations such as Congleton Community Projects, Congleton Jazz and Blues Team, Friends of Congleton Park, Congleton Partnership and Congleton Town Council who work hard to put on fabulous events for the town such as Congleton Unplugged, Congleton Jazz and Blues, Food and Drink Festival, Health and Wellbeing Fayre, Christmas Lights Switch-On, Easter Treats Day and Brass on the Grass. These established events, along with new events such as the monthly Makers Market which started in April 2018 and is held on the last Saturday of the month, encourages residents and visitors to come into town. These events rely on a huge amount of time and effort given by volunteers.

It has been an incredible year for women! During the year that women celebrated 100 years of women over 30 being able to vote, as well as myself as Mayor, we had females in the roles of Deputy Mayor and Mayor's Cadet. After the elections of the 2nd May, Congleton also gained national recognition as the first town in the UK to elect a Women's Equality Party councillor.

Other notable achievements and anniversaries are the:

- 11th November 2018 100 years since the end of the Great War, which saw an incredible turnout at the town's cenotaph. This is due to be renovated with the addition of 250 missing service personnel names
- 20th anniversary of Congleton in Bloom, who secured a gold for the town in the National In Bloom Finals and was awarded 'Best Kept Town in Cheshire' through Cheshire Community Pride
- 20th anniversary of the successful University of the 3rd age in Congleton
- 10th anniversary of the increasingly successful Congleton Food and Drink Festival
- 10th anniversary of Congleton's award winning apple juice made at the Old Saw Mill

In my year of office I have raised around £15,000 which will be shared amongst my chosen charities, Ruby's Fund and LOL Foundations and a number of other youth organisations in Congleton.

During the year we have celebrated 700 years of having a Town Mayor with a magnificent medieval banquet in the Town Hall and the wonderful King Edward's Musical Society of Macclesfield who played on the 24th February as a final event for the celebrations included a specially commissioned piece of music. 
The Personnel Committee and Strategy Working Group are held as and when necessary.

How is the Town Council Financed?

The majority of the Town Council's funds come from a precept which is added to the Council Tax levy set by the Principal Authority. In 2018-19 the precept was £836,152. Total cost of Streetscape Services was £562,650 of which £366,706 is funded through the Cheshire East Council contract.

Below is a summary of the income and expenditure for the year ending 31st March 2019. The funds are spent providing services and representing the people of Congleton. In broad terms, in 2018-19 the Town Council spent the money raised on the following:

Services Provided

What Services does the Town Council Provide:

Congleton Town Council is one of the largest of the 108 town and parish councils in Cheshire East. The Town Council was founded in 1980 and became fully operational in April 1981. The Town Council provides the most local tier of government for Congleton.

It serves the local community by;

- Providing an essential link between town residents and Cheshire East Borough Council to ensure grass roots views are heard and considered
- Encouraging economic development and regeneration of the Town
- Examining planning and licensing applications and giving opinions to the Borough Council on behalf of local residents
- Managing a range of local services and facilities to benefit Congleton including the Town Hall, street cleansing and grounds maintenance services, paddling pool and allotments
- Providing financial support to a variety of community groups and organisations which support the wellbeing of Congleton residents
- Streetscape Services in the surrounding Parishes

Congleton Town Council covers an area of 2255 hectares (22.55 sq km or 8.7 square miles) with a population of around 26,900 (figure from the 2011 census).

Since January 2014 the Town Council has delivered Grounds and Cleansing Services for Congleton, via a devolved services agreement with Cheshire East and ANSA. This includes grounds maintenance - mowing, hedge cutting, pruning of shrubs etc. and street cleansing functions- emptying of over 175 litter and dog bins each day, removal of fly tips, litter picking and generally keeping Congleton a safe and tidy town to live in.

The Town Council is the accountable body for Congleton Partnership, and also provides substantial grants to Congleton Community Projects (£16K), Congleton Partnership (£15k) and Congleton's Citizen's Advice Bureau (£15K). In addition Congleton Town Council supports the full costs of an additional Police Community Support Officer (£33k) for the Town.

Congleton Town Council activities are based around five key goals:

- An Active and Engaged Community
- A Sustainable Environment



Key Achievements

Some of the memorable achievements of 2018/19 were:

- Providing direct support to Congleton in Bloom which received a gold standard in both the National Britain in Bloom finals and the North West regional competitions and was the overall Champion of the Cheshire Community Pride Competition.
- Events to celebrate 700 years of Mayoralty in Congleton, including a medieval banquet in the Town Hall, a
 musical concert, placing Mayor's pictures in the Grand Hall and revamping the Mayor's Roll of Honour, listing
 Mayors back to 1318.
- Cross-party group set up to fight for health services for Congleton and the War Memorial hospital
- Massive turn-out at the cenotaph to remember 100 years since the end of WW1
- Regular monthly Makers Markets started in April last Saturday of the month.
- Taking the Neighbourhood Plan through regulation 15 and submitting to the Examiner
- Being present at the sod cutting, marking the start of the Congleton Link Road construction
- After consultation with the public, submitting a bid to purchase Bradshaw House on Lawton Street
- Three play areas were improved thanks to the support of Congleton Partnership and Ansa.

Some key areas of work for 2018/19 were:

An Active and Engaged Community

- · Administered the community grant scheme to help support and develop local group
- Supported the re-modelling and creation of a more suitable cenotaph for the town by agreeing a £90k underwrite.
- Continue to develop the Town Council website it is visited by more than 3,000 unique visitors a month. Update
 the Town noticeboards weekly. Increased the Town Council's Social Media presence. Produce Bear Necessities
 four times per year and other promotional material
- Continue to engage in the town's next generation by supporting youth organisations and facilities, working with the Town's Youth Council Committee, promoting the town's play areas, assisted in the first play day in the Town Centre, supporting the Youth Forum and engaging with the schools
- Continued to work with Congleton Partnership towards creating a Dementia Friendly Town.
- Support sport & leisure facilities and activities which promote healthy lifestyles, including activities to improve cycling and walking facilities and sports pitch provision for Congleton
- · Maintain the Mayor's Cadet Scheme
- Support the work of the Congleton Neighbourhood Plan team, with assistance from volunteers and key members of the community to get the plan to a stage where it could be sent to the Examiner.
- Held a second Sprint Triathlon, encouraging exercise and raising several thousand for the Town Mayor's Charities

A Sustainable Environment

- Streetscape services target issues that protect and enhance the local environment, improve green open spaces and create more sustainable planting areas
- Encouraged more volunteers to become involved in the town clean teams, RHS It's Your Neighbourhood schemes and the wider Congleton In Bloom campaign
- Making the town safer by funding an additional Police Community Support Officer, supporting Cheshire East with winter gritting, funding the coverage of CCTV in the town and supporting Pub Watch
- Installing measures to improve energy efficiency in the Town Hall
- Working with Congleton Partnership to add additional trees to Mountbatten Way
- Developing policies in the Neighbourhood Plan to safeguard green spaces, encourage sustainable transport and to improve and connect cycle routes throughout Congleton

A Celebrated and Protected Heritage

- Continued to support Congleton Museum's acquisition of Bradshaw House
- Promoted the Town Council's Civic Role through Mayoralty and Town Crier activities
- Worked with third parties to ensure that planned regeneration and new developments reflect the heritage and traditional architecture of the Town
- Promote access to Town Treasures and the Town Hall and joined in the first Congleton Heritage and Antiques Festival.
- Working with Congleton Cenotaph Group to renovate and add missing names to the Cenotaph and agreed an under-write of £90K to enable this project to progress with confidence.

A Strong and Diverse Economy

- Saw the completion of the Public Realm improvement scheme in the pedestrian area
- Lobbied Cheshire East for use of S106 money to improve areas in Congleton
- Continue to lobby for an upgraded Leisure Centre for Congleton planning permission was granted in April 2019.
- Increased the number of events in the Town Centre with the intention of encouraging greater footfall and new visitors into the town centre.
- Continued to work with the Institute of Place Management as one of seven UK towns involved in an Innovate UK funded Big Data Small User project to understand ways to improve footfall and sales in the High Street
- Lobbied for high quality employment sites and improvement of existing Business Parks to be included in the emerging Cheshire East Local Plan
- Witnessed the start of the Link Road construction which should benefit the town by reducing congestion, improve air quality, better access to industrial estates and the town centre

Key Priorities for 2019/20

- Further reduce the deficit on the Town Hall working budget through an uptake in bookings and efficiency costs
- Continue to Develop the Streetscape Services so that they can generate income to help off-set costs and maintain the high level of service that the town expects
- Help raise additional funds required for the renovation of Congleton Cenotaph so that the Town Council underwrite can be reduced
- Make sure that the Congleton Neighbourhood Plan is fit for purpose and one that local people will want to support at Referendum
- Maximise opportunities for the retention and enhancement of Green Open Spaces in the town
- Support the development of high quality indoor and outdoor recreational facilities.
- Introduce more quality events for Congleton and improve the marketing of the town as a great place to live, work, visit and do business.
- Work with the Police and other parties to reduce Anti-Social Behaviour in the town
- Work with all political parties to safeguard local health services for Congleton and the surrounding area.
- Obtain Gold Level Accreditation with the Local Council Award Scheme
