National Knife Crime Week

It is currently National Knife Crime Week and as such Congleton Police have been highlighting the dangers of knife crime to local youths. Assemblies have been conducted at both Congleton High School and Eaton Bank Academy for the year 12 and 13 year groups and some presentations have been given to year 8 pupils. Further to this Congleton PCSOs have been highlighting the dangers via social media, Facebook and Twitter. An amnesty bin has been located in the front office of the Police Station, this too is being advertised via social media.

Rise in thefts from vans

There has been a recent increase in offences of theft from motor vehicles in the Congleton area. In reaction to this officers have conducted a large scale leaflet drop highlighting the increase to as many van owners as possible throughout the town. Furthermore Selecta DNA was handed out to victims of car crime.


Across the Macclesfield Local Policing Unit as a whole, there was a reported increase in offences of theft from/of motor vehicles which had a keyless entry. This did not particularly affect Congleton but awareness was raised where practical. Within the last few days a male was arrested and charged with two offences of theft of motor vehicle. He is currently awaiting his Crown Court date for sentencing.

Memorial Gardens

Following reports of anti-social behaviour and the plants being pulled up in the Memorial Garden, PCSO SHORE put signs up stating that the police were monitoring the area and since this time no further reports have been received.

3 x warrants have taken place under the Misuse of Drugs Act, all of which were positive and the enquiries are on-going for each.

- 2. Minutes of the meeting held on 12th December 2018 were noted and approved
- 3. Outstanding Actions from last meeting.
 - a) Postcards for Shops these have been printed and in the process of being distributed. Cost £38 for 300 copies. Will await for feedback from shops. Could become an annual event.
 - b) **Bollards and Yellow lines** should be installed in the next 4-6 weeks. It will involve a Sunday road closure. Send a note to the shops about the couriers. Police have been enforcing.
 - c) CCTV JMacA to chase and see what the procedure is. Application was submitted in early December.

4. Update on Public Space Protection Order

No tickets issued. Police and Youth Offending Team have not been made aware or any additional problems. Stay as a regular item.

5. Drug and Alcohol Abuse Priorities

- a) No new areas Hot Spot Areas Area behind Well Pharmacy on Park Lane,
 Congleton Park, cut though to Antrobus Street Car Park from Mill Street.
- b) Police working on intelligence gathering and building evidence to gain warrants. Number of planned operations in the next few weeks. On-going work. If found guilty and in social housing they can be served notice. Issue with evidence gathering and people being prepared to tell the Police what they know. Councillors can play a role in reporting issues and suspicions.

6. Anti-Social Behaviour Hot Spots

a) Question raised about Public Toilets in the park – in the winter the toilets are open 8.30am – 3.30pm. In the summer they are open until 6pm. Disabled toilet

works on a Radar Key so if someone has a key they are able to access the disabled toilet at any time. Agreed to monitor, particularly over the summer.

- b) Noted that the three Crewe youths who had their names and pictures in the paper have been behaving since being named.
- c) There was a discussions around the tents and rough sleepers in Crewe and Macclesfield town centre. Good support from the Police and Cheshire East. Watching brief to make sure that it doesn't become an issue in our town.
- d) CCTV request for Park Road wing mirrors and damage to cars. Problem seems to be late at night but not known who is causing the damage. Need to know the number of incidents and over what time frame. Police to give feedback
- e) Opportunist theft in the park 5th February 2019 in the enclosed play area bag taken. Police informed.
- f) Watching brief on a group of young secondary school girls (aged 12/13) causing a number of issues. Youth Offending team is aware and speaking with those involved, as well as with schools and parents to try and stop issues escalating.

7. CCTV

Information on the third quarter CCTV reports were received and circulated. The group is keen to see how Congleton compares with other towns in Cheshire East and whether the seasonal changes are expected. JMacA to chase up.

8. AOB

Ruth Burgess circulated some information about the Home Office giving more powers to the Police to deal with illegal travellers communities setting up temporary camps on private land and causing a nuisance to local residents.

2. Outstanding Actions from last meeting.

The breaches will go back to the Youth Offending Team as they are responsible for action against the breach not the police. Update at next meeting. This is the only action related to Crewe gang in the past couple of months. The ring-leader for previous trouble was released from prison last month.
- **b)** Two Eastern European ladies were charged for stealing purses and mobile phones.

- a) Possible rough sleeper behind Barn Road, but not causing an issue, but to report to CEC Rough Sleeping.
- b) Licensing, noted that there have been complaints from shops about the Lion and Swan and treatment of people coming out from venue and creating mess. Noted that the Kings Arms had to close for a short while due to not having a premises licence. All sorted now.
- c) GW Noticed there is a number of bus shelters being damaged. Appears to be deliberate. CEC repairing. Police to keep an eye out on this.

- After change is made, minutes approved.
- 2. Declarations of Interest- Members are requested to declare both "pecuniary" and "non-pecuniary" interests as early in the meeting as they become known.

- 3. Monthly Working Groups- with volunteers (Litter picking, weeding, leaf clearing, dead heading etc IYN Sites) First Saturday of the month 10am -12pm. Next meeting 6th April at Astbury Mere- who is the lead on this? GW to take a lead on this. Need to check with the Astbury Mere Trust as to whether they are happy for us to start here- Action PP. This date falls within the Keep Britain Tidy time. GW requested some of the better quality gloves- JMac/ MH to order.

More litter pickers ordered, Brereton are litter picking on the same day and so will be borrowing equipment from Cheshire East. Streetscape have made a padlocked bin where equipment will be stored. Litter pickers are expensive and so agreed not to give out to volunteers unless committed to litter picking and bringing it back every time. These will be counted in and out each time.

JMac/ MH- to email/ Facebook/ website/ press release etc.

Feedback from 2nd March- over 30 people, went really well, went beyond the park.

Need to make sure to get pictures at the next clean up- Action PP

- 4. Grass Verge Maintenance (BE)- Lorries driving over these and turning the grasses up- GW suggested to report to Cheshire East Highways. Take pictures of this if you see the damage.
 - **Verge along Mountbatten Way-** agreed last year that we would seed this area, as a wildflower area- PP suggested to grow wildflower plugs and plant these- before we do this, we need to find out who owns the area as CEH believe this does not belong to them. JMac to check with Richard Cooper & Andrew Kelly about ownership of this land.

There are Cheshire East signs on here that have faded, need to re-do these.

- 5. Plastic Recycling- Metal Bear Design- (AMorrison)- Belmont Engineering waiting on a design for this.
- 6. In Bloom Postcards (AMorrison)

attended last year.

- 7. Expenses (JMac)- Reminder that the Town Council are at the end of year accounts and so if people need to claim expenses, need to do this ASAP (before the end of March).
- **8. Budget** Last year's budget, expenditure £19,500; £12,000 in the budget, an extra £3,000 from the Town Council as being in both competitions in 2018, plus £4,500 sponsorship. Slight overspend. Throughout the year we need to keep a check on funds so that we don't go over again.

PP mentioned that the Southport awards may set maximum ticket numbers per group, as too many people

Sponsorship- Currently not gone out for sponsors yet, JMac is putting a sponsorship leaflet together, once printed, will send out to key contacts. **Leaflet:** change the front cover to have a Welcome to Congleton sign with daffodil signs underneath to make the leaflet more connected to Congleton.

Large Planter Tubs- PP wondered if the large planters could reduce in price and get them all sponsored rather than not all of them being sponsored. See if more Town Centre local businesses would sponsor these and hopefully look after/ weed these themselves.

- 9. Feedback from Newcastle Under Lyme In Bloom Trip (JMac/BE/DB)- Initially went to see how they do In Bloom any differently. They keep their main tour as there's, they may dip into the Neighbourhoods, but they keep these separate.
 - Received funds and so much was donated in kind. They employ an agency member od staff as a dedicated marketing person with set targets to gain a set amount of sponsorship needed to cover the project.
- 10. Feedback from North West In Bloom Coordinators Meeting (PP/ MG)- Well attended, had updates on figures and indicated updates for 2019.

Neighbourhoods- each neighbourhood needs a different name on the form, as if the same name- only get one payment per name, even if different groups.

Social Prescribing- to encourage more people to get out and connected with In Bloom- we have good examples of this with care homes and Margaret's Place etc. Suggested to involve patients in plant ups in certain areas. There will be a Health & Wellbeing discretionary award- BE suggested to get In Bloom posters into surgeries.

Marking Sheets- Out of 100 not 200, each category will be out of 10 not 20- help to make judging more standardised. The new sheet should help to self-evaluate to see where each group is up to. Will be judged on support and sponsorship. This will all be coming out electronically.

- MG suggested to have an In Bloom twitter account as businesses are keen on using twitter and so can gain more followers/ support from this.
- Suggested to keep a volunteer register of hours.
- Local Authority to put forward a park for an award- fill the form in and send off to In Bloom- deadline of 29th
 March- agreed £50 fee, rather than £100.
- PP & MG spoke to the judges about the length of judging days and discussed about having 1.5 judging days rather than 1 long day.
- Advised that there is now an organisation in place to help with sponsorship towards the railway stationwww.communityrail.org.uk - would be good to have planters on the platform- could a Mossley volunteer group look after this? GW to apply for this.
- Residential homes now go as a Neighbourhood and don't have to pay- Astbury Mere Care home shouldn't have to pay this year.
- We can put in a request of when we would like to be judged- MG suggested early July as schools are still in place and we would like children to take part along the route. This is also before Tatton. PP & MG are concerned that when the schools are closed it'd be difficult to get children involved- GW suggested that a responsibility of the B2B groups is that some of the children have to participate on judging day. Ask Mel and Teresa when they think judging should be (early or late July)- try not to have a Monday!
 - ** Beech House are making bird boxes for In Bloom, Heath View suggested they would like some.
- 11. Hanging Basket Update (MH/ JMac)- Currently at 100 baskets, last year in total we had 230, so we have some chasing to do, action MH. JMac to pay for x10 out of the Town Centre budget to put on empty buildings. Check on price of planting up per basket from Ansa. Members of the groups to split the list and target a group of shops each.
- **12.** In Bloom Stall at Easter Treats Day- 9th April, 10.30am-1.30pm (MH)- PP & MG interested in planting up, can sort a gazebo and table for this, banner, seeds and litter planters.


- Cheshire Community Action- Community Pride Award- Agreed to enter this again, deadline of 5th May.
- Tatton- 16th-20th July- MG & PP are doing this, the commitment from CTC/ In Bloom will be getting the plants there and back and insurance for this. Using the community polytunnels to plant up. Once finished there will be a mini garden planted up to show what it looked at Tatton. Buying the plants

themselves and hopefully getting the money back through selling them after Tatton has finished. In Bloom group confirmed as the main sponsor. MG & PP have ordered plants from DJM Nurseries costing just over £300- DB suggested to underwrite this- group agreed.

14. Ansa Recycling Trip- Shotton- 28th March- to make sure that no-one misses out on this.

- Thank you to U3A Knit, Sew & Natter Group for donating £100 towards In Bloom projects- ACTION to send a thankyou letter from the Chairman
- Meeting with Graham Construction (JMac)- would like to get involved with In Bloom, they would like to get a photo out of this with the team, wearing Hi-Viz etc. They want to get the message out about what they do and all the environmental aspects. Team of 30 Graham people currently living close to Congleton, would be able to join in with any clean-ups on the early evenings etc. They're putting in over 1000 new trees in the area, could incorporate daffodils along stretches of the road. Looking at more physical involvement rather than sponsorship. They are sponsoring a full page in the next BN.
- Community Polytunnel- PP has noticed holes in the polytunnels- needs looking at.
- **Mel Kirby-** willing to come down in the next couple of weeks to take a look at our entry and make pointers on this.
- **Food4Free Garden-** Val has been working on this, ordered a lot of new herbs to put in and weeded etcthis project is self-funding through Food4Free.
- Community Garden- PP & MG have put a lot of work into this over the past couple of weeks. Suggested to get new shrubs, need more funding in this area. There is a U3A group that have started on more regular work here. Monday's 2-4pm. Insurances for this- PP/ MG check with U3A if the group is insured to do this- or we need sign the group up to the CTC form and so covered here.
- Margaret's Place- thought about adding a food4free area here, after planting, would need maintenance funds to keep this ongoing afterwards.



From Frome Town Council website:

What we do:

Amongst the usual work, they have:

- Work towards making Frome an independent and more environmentallysustainable town

Frome Town Council is leading and supporting a wide variety of community projects.

Clean future: On 5th December 2018 Frome Town Council declared a climate emergency and committed to going zero carbon by 2030.

Congleton Green: declare something similar and give Congleton Partnership the task of delivery

Community Fridge: Food waste is responsible for 10% of global greenhouse gas emissions. An estimated 15 million tonnes of food is wasted each year in the UK, enough to fill Wembley Stadium 18 times over. At the same time 4 million people live in food poverty in the UK. To tackle this issue in May 2016 Frome Town Council worked with Edventure and a team of volunteers to set up the UK's first community fridge. A community larder was launched in October 2018 to accommodate items that don't need refrigeration.

Congleton Green: Food waste is a huge issue, experience from the Old Saw Mill suggests that a shop somewhere appropriate with a man with a van could distribute the copious amounts of food wasted each day from the supermarkets. Café's can't use it it fowls the Food Regs!

Co-wheels: Frome's car sharing club Co-wheels is expanding its presence in the town with a second car and residents have the chance to sign up as members for just £1!

Car sharing is the cheaper and more environment friendly alternative to owning a car.

Working with Frome Town Council, Co-wheels will now have two low emission cars in Frome – one outside the Town Hall and another at the Cheese and Grain car park. **Congleton Green task the 5 largest employers in the town to produce transport plans for their employees minimising car movements using public transport and**

EBikes: Ever thought about trying an EBike here in Frome? Here at Frome Tow Council we are keen on cycling: It is good for health and a good source of sustainable transport. However we recognise that many people are put off using a bicycle in Frome because of the hills.

The solution? The town now has a couple of electric power assist bicycles available for people in Frome to hire. The electric assistance helps to reduce the strain of cycling up hills and makes cycling more fun. Provided by Frome Town Council and available at Cycology Bikes Tuesday – Saturday 9am – 5pm for either half day (£5) or whole day (£10) hire.

Congleton Green: Deliver SAS's Cycling Plan

Energy: Cutting costs and carbon

Here are some of the things we're doing to help cut costs and carbon, reduce fuel poverty and make the town more energy resilient:

- 1. Working in partnership with CSE we have a team of energy volunteers who do regular advice sessions and can visit vulnerable homes to help them cut their energy costs.
- 2. We keep people informed about insulation offers and grants when they are available. Winter Warm Bundle can help you work out what support you might be eligible for.
- 3. We have use of a thermal imaging camera to pinpoint areas where local homes are leaking heat
- 4. We work with FRECo and a team of energy specialists to support local schools to cut carbon and costs, engaging and empowering the students and staff to support this. We are currently working with Selwood Academy, Frome College and St Johns Primary School.
- 5. We put solar panels on the Cheese and Grain saving 560 tonnes of carbon dioxide and helped them switch to low energy LED lighting.
- 6. We have worked with Fair Frome, Frome Renewable Energy Co-op and others to tackle fuel poverty, enabling 250 people to switch energy supplier and save on average over £200 a year.
- 7. We helped organise Frome Open Homes to showcase ways to cut carbon and costs. The event was attended by over 600 people, 97% of whom said they found their visit inspiring and useful.
- 8. We co-organise regular events such as Improve Don't Move and One Planet Sunday.
- 9. We are a founding member of Frome Renewable Energy Co-op (FRECO) who raised £300,000 in just five days through community shares in May 2015. They have now installed 150kw of solar on Frome Medical Practice and 50kw on Frome Football Club's new community stand (which we also helped secure funding for).
- 10. We are working with other partners to explore opportunities for hydro power along the river Frome and Anaerobic Digestion for local farms

Congleton Green: Our versions of 1, 2, 3, 6, 7, 8 and 10.

Improve Don't Move: On Saturday 8th June Frome Town Council are hosting a free 'Improve Don't Move' event to showcase ways to refurbish your home to cut costs and carbon.

The event offers an opportunity for local residents to speak to architects, designers and contractors who specialise in home renovation, redesign and improvements so you can improve your home rather than selling up and buying elsewhere.

Congleton Green: Organise an annual Town Hall exhibition and workshops: how to become carbon neutral in your home and work.

Plastic Free: On 13th December 2017 Frome Town Council unanimously agreed to become a 'single-use' plastic-free council. This will be done by phasing out the use of unrecyclable single-use plastic products in all council activities by April 2018.

Congleton Green: We know in CSG how complex this subject is but create initiatives that capture people's imagination: bear plastic litter bins, reuse of black plastic garden stuff for instance.

Reducing Waste: Here are some of the things we're doing to improve resource use in Frome:

We set up the UK's first Sharing Shop in partnership with Edventure. A Library of Things now has over 300 members and 500 items to lend. It also offers weekly skill sharing events and an annual sharing festival.

Congleton Green: Love the Sharing Shop idea, link it with the waste food shop?

Solar Streets: New Solar Streets Project Launched for Frome

Local solar installer IDDEA is working with Frome Renewable Energy Co-op and Frome Town Council to offer significantly discounted solar for Frome households. Director Ian Dunstone said 'A 4 kw solar pv system to generate clean electricity would usually cost around £6000. If ten households sign up in Frome, we can reduce this to £3750, including a £50 donation to a local community solar project via FRECo. People who recommend the scheme to a friend will also receive £100 if the installation goes ahead.'

Congleton Green: Great idea but I think this needs rethinking in light of FiTs being cancelled.

The Green Directory: The Green Directory is full of suppliers and businesses to help you improve your home and make it more comfortable and environmentally friendly.

Congleton Green: Great idea list on Congleton Partnership website?

Transport Strategy: Transport has a huge impact on our lives, on the environment and on the local economy. Whilst it is not an area that town and parish councils usually get involved in, there are some key actions that can be taken that can help to increase active lifestyles, reduce air pollution and enhance the local economy.

Congleton Green: Get behind the CEC Transport Strategy?

Council leader calls for action on 'climate change emergency'

23 May 2019

The leader of Cheshire East Council has called for local action to help tackle 'the emergency of climate change'.

A notice of motion tabled by the authority's new leader Councillor Sam Corcoran, which was seconded by Councillor Quentin Abel and backed by a unanimous vote of full council, called for a Cheshire East environmental strategy to be brought forward 'as a matter of urgency'.

The motion also called for the council to be carbon neutral by 2025 and said the local authority 'will work to encourage all businesses, residents and organisations in the borough to reduce their carbon footprint – by reducing energy consumption and promoting healthy lifestyles'.

Cllr Corcoran's notice of motion follows Parliament's declaration earlier this month of an 'environment and climate emergency'.


Councillor Sam Corcoran said: "The council recognises the importance of climate change and wants to reduce its carbon footprint even further. The key things we can do are to reduce the number of buildings we hold, improve the efficiency of our energy systems, promote recycling, increase the use of renewable energy and ensure we use vehicles efficiently in the delivery of our operational services.

"The council plans to bring forward a draft environment strategy in July, which will outline the steps the council can take to improve its impact on climate change and the environment."

Councillor Craig Browne, deputy leader of the council and leader of the Independent group, said: "Climate change is an important issue and we must all do what we can, both as a council and as individuals, which is why I am supporting this motion. However, if this issue is to be seriously addressed, then it will need more agreement and co-operation at the national and international level."


Councillor Janet Clowes, group leader for the Conservative group, said: "Climate change is a global issue that demands collaborative action at international levels. However, individuals and organisations still have a vital role to play.

"Cheshire East Council has embraced this challenge and is already scheduled to launch its own environment strategy over the summer, building on its current 42 per cent carbon footprint reduction (achieved in 2016) and aiming to reduce it by a further 20 per cent by 2020."

Background	Congleton Makers Market is run by an independent company called the Makers Market. The company started hosting monthly market in Congleton in April 2018. They also hold monthly markets in 18 other locations across Greater Manchester, Cheshire and Staffordshire. The Town Council and Cheshire East Council approved the idea of the monthly artisan market. The intention was to create a monthly event that would increase footfall into the town centre, bringing more people into the town and giving existing shops and businesses the opportunity to showcase their business. The Makers Market made it clear that their intension was to complement what was already on offer in the town centre and not to compete with existing traders. Advice was sought by the traders and others on the best time of the month and best day to hold such a market. There was pros and cons for both the Saturday and the Sunday. It was settled on the last Saturday of the month. Some concerns have been raised by some traders that rather than helping their business, the Makers Market gives them a worse day and have asked about the market being moved to Sunday instead of a Saturday. The Makers Market hold a premises licence to hold a market on Congleton's pedestrian area on either a Saturday or Sunday.				
	We know from the footfall cameras that were installed in the pedestrian area as part of Big Data Small User Project that footfall increased by around 3,000 – 4,000 movements on Makers Market Saturdays. However greater numbers of people in the pedestrian area does not necessarily equate to greater spend in the businesses.				
,·	A survey of local shops was carried out to gauge their opinions on the market. The results are not conclusive. This paper highlights the results of the survey and actions currently being taken. Councillors are asked to note the report and comment on the findings.				
Details					

Survey Monkey survey was sent out to shops and businesses in the High Street, Pedestrian Area, Little Street, Victoria Street, Swan Bank and Mill Street. This was sent out via email and paper copies were delivered to those who do not often respond via email.

There are 105 operating businesses in this area. 41 of the businesses responded - 13 in the pedestrian area, 15 in the High Street, 4 in Little Street, 2 in the Bridestones, 3 in Swan Bank and 3 in Mill Street. The majority that responded were retail shops or cafes. One bar, one bank and one charity shop and two hairdressers or beauticians responded

Of these, 8 reported that the Makers Market has had a very positive impact, 8 a positive impact, 7 a very negative impact, 6 a negative impact and 11 said it had made no impact. Overall 28 thought the Makers Market was a good addition to the town, 8 thought it wasn't and 6 weren't sure.

When asked about the future potential changes for the Makers Market the views remained mixed:

Should the Makers Market change location

9 agreed or strongly agreed, 20 disagreed or strongly disagreed

Should the Makers Market move to a Sunday

22 agreed or strongly agreed, 14 disagreed or strongly disagreed

Should the Market stay as it is

15 agreed or strongly agreed, 15 disagreed or strongly disagreed

Should we increase the number of Maker Market style events

12 agreed or strongly agreed, 15 disagreed or strongly disagreed

Should we decrease the number of Makers Markets

7 agreed or strongly agreed, 13 disagreed.


Many comments were received, both positive and negative. AGENDA ITEM REPORT TITLE	14 Reducing Road Traffic Speed Limit on Reades Lane			
Background	The Town Council has received a request from residents on Reades Lane looking for the Town Council's support in getting the 30mph speed limit on Reades Lane extended as far as the Coach and Horses Public House on road safety grounds.			
	Cheshire East Council as the Highway Authority is responsible for setting speed limits on local roads. This is carried out in accordance with the Speed Management Strategy (September 2016) www.cheshireeast.gov.uk/pdf/highways/speed-management-strategy.pdf The Town Council can use its local knowledge to ask that an area is reviewed by Cheshire East Council.			
Details	Reades Lane is the road from Mossley crossroads leading towards Leek/Timbersbrook. This is a 30mph road until High Trees, just before the railway bridge. The road then becomes a 40mph for 0.6 miles which makes it difficult for residents living in the 12 houses and one lane to get out of their drives. There have been three Road Traffic Accidents including one fatality in the past five years in this area. According to the local postman and residents, there has also been several near misses along this stretch of road.			
	The residents are requesting that the Town Council asks Cheshire East to review the speed limit along this stretch of road. They appreciate that there is not 600m of continuous house frontage, however considering the number of actual road traffic collisions and near misses, they believe it is reasonable to ask for the 30mph limit to be extended for the 0.6 miles from the 40mph sign to the fork in the road at the Coaches and Horses.			
u u	It could also be argued that on the descent into the town this 0.6 mile stretch of road is confusing. Although it is a 40 mph road, there are four slow signs painted onto the road and three signs indicating bends and a 30 mph limit.			
	Speed limits are a key source of information to road users, particularly as an indicator of the nature of risks to be expected so it would alert drivers to the dangers in this area.

AGENDA ITEM REPORT TITLE	15. Request for a Dropped Kerb by the Citizens Advice Bureau, Lawton Street and wider review of Dropped Kerbs in Congleton		
Background	A recent visit by wheelchair to the Citizens Advice Bureau was made difficult by the lack of dropped kerb on the Citizen Advice Bureau (CAB) side of Lawton Street close to the CAB centre. There is a dropped kerb by the League of Friends Hospital charity shop and another by Bradshaw House, but nothing on the south side of the road in between these two ends. On the northern side of the road there are dropped kerbs opposite the League of Friends and Bradshaw House. There is also a dropped kerb for an entrance to a yard opposite the Citizens Advice Bureau. A conversation with members of staff at the CAB centre established that the lack of a dropped kerb is an issue for a number of users. Dropped kerbs are a duty of Cheshire East Council and there is an allocated budget for dropped kerbs. The Town Council has been asked for support in lobbying Cheshire East for a dropped kerb at this site.
