Congleton Market

Congleton Retail Market is open every Tuesday and Saturday and is based on the lower level of the Bridestones Centre, near Morrisons car park. There is also a car boot sale on a Sunday. The Market consists of an indoor market area and an outdoor area with a mixture of regular stalls, car boot stalls and some guest stalls. For many years the market was run by a private company called City Markets, who rented the space from Cheshire East Council. City Markets

ended the contract in November 2018 and the market returned to Cheshire East Council. Many people have signed a petition asking Congleton Town Council to run the market. Cheshire East has supplied details of costs and the market traders have nominated four people to represent them. These traders will be meeting with officers and councillors to explore alternative ways to run the market, and the costs and benefits to the public of making changes.

Town Council Grants

Congleton Town Council provides thousands of pounds of grant aid and sponsorship to Congleton groups and organisations every year. To apply for a grant you need to complete the application form found on the Town Council website www.congleton-tc.gov.uk/your-council/grants A decision on your application will be made by Councillors at the next available Finance and Policy Committee.

To be eligible for a grant or sponsorship you need to be either:

- A Congleton-based charity
- · An organisation serving the needs of Congleton citizens
- Citizens requiring a grant to put on an event or project for the benefit of a wider group in Congleton
- Congleton-based club or association serving a specific section of the community.

Work on Cenotaph Delayed

Work on the Congleton Cenotaph in Lawton Street, which will enhance the area and include 14 new plaques containing the 238 missing names as well as the 351 names currently included at the site, has been put back until April 2020. It is now planned to have the opening ceremony for the new-look site in September 2020. There is still time for companies, organisations and individuals to

become 'Friends of the Cenotaph' by making a financial donation to the appeal to build the new memorial. Those who donate and wish to be named will be included on a 'friends board' on the site.

Top Tips...

Quit wasting energy - turn lights off when you leave the room, don't leave appliances on stand-by, switch them off and save energy!

See the Light energy saving bulbs are more expensive to buy, but save energy and can last upto 10 times longer. Fitting just one compact fluorescent bulb can save £3 to £6 per year.

Turning it down turning your heating down by one degree centigrade could save £75 per year, or even more!

Plastic Free Congleton

Plastic Free Congleton is a new group which has been set up to reduce the use of avoidable single-use plastic in our town. Plastic is everywhere! But when it lands on our streets, it can then enter our rivers and waterways and then onto our beaches and oceans. To help prevent this plastic pollution, one of the focuses of the group will be to perform and organise community litter picks along our beautiful River Dane and Macclesfield Canal.

Businesses, schools and community groups are invited to become 'Plastic Free Champions'. Going plastic free is not easy, but it can be easy to reduce our plastic use. Simple things can reduce the amount of plastic you use such as carrying:

- Reusable bags
- Reusable coffee cup
- Refillable water bottle
- Cutlery set

Becoming Carbon Neutral

Cheshire East Council and Congleton Town Council have set themselves the challenge of becoming carbon neutral by 2025. Could you set yourselves the same challenge?

The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change has said that to do this we need to:

- buy less meat, milk, cheese and butter
- eat more locally sourced seasonal food and throw less of it away
- drive electric cars, walk or cycle short distances, and take trains and buses instead of planes, where possible
- use video conferencing instead of business travel
- use a washing line instead of a tumble dryer
- insulate homes; demand low carbon in every consumer product
- plant trees.

Congleton Sustainability Group has run Sustainable Living in Congleton (SLIC) courses for the past few years.

NHS Congleton War Memorial Hospital

Managing the joint concerns of financial pressures and increasing demands for health services is a massive challenge. In Cheshire East, the agencies involved in the delivery of health services are working together on a soon-to-be published Five-Year Plan. As an area with a growing population, Congleton Town Council is keen to see as many health services as possible delivered as locally as possible. Here we look at Congleton War Memorial Hospital in Canal Road.



Congleton War Memorial Hospital was opened in 1924 following fundraising by local people as a memorial to those who died in the First World War. East Cheshire NHS Trust provides a range of services from Congleton War Memorial Hospital, including:

- Aston Ward 28 bed intermediate care ward
- Blood test clinics (Monday Friday 8.30am -11.15am)
- Consultant-led outpatient services
- District nursing
- GP Out-of-Hours appointments
- The Minor Injuries Unit
- Outpatient therapy services including a physiotherapy gym
- Audiology
- Midwives
- Podiatry
- Paediatric Speech and Language Therapy
- Epilepsy
- Sexual Health Clinic
- Leg Ulcer Clinic

Minor Injuries Unit Opening Hours

The Minor Injuries Unit is open Monday to Friday - 9am to 5pm with a break for lunch from 1pm to 1.30pm. The unit has been closed on weekends and bank holidays for the past three years. The Minor Injuries Unit is a great resource where local people can be treated for minor injuries such as minor burns, cuts, splinters and sprains.

The unit can be subject to temporary closures at short notice due to staff redeployment to Macclesfield hospital, so it is worth checking for closures before visiting - see the Minor Injuries Unit page at www.eastcheshire.nhs.uk

The Aston Unit

The Aston Unit provides 28 beds for patients requiring intermediate care. This type of care is for people who no longer need the acute care and can therefore continue their recovery in a homely and relaxed environment.

This can be an important step on the pathway home or to longer term care. Intermediate care on the Aston Unit is available to anyone registered with a GP practice in the NHS Eastern Cheshire Clinical Commissioning Group area. Around a quarter of patients on the unit are registered with a Congleton GP.

The Physiotherapy Gym at Congleton

The Physiotherapy Gym, pictured above, features equipment to support the rehabilitation of patients with a range of musculoskeletal conditions. Rehabilitation classes for conditions such as knee joint replacement, hip joint replacement and ligament repair surgery take place in this gym area, along with individual sessions depending on the patient's goals. Referrals are through your GP.

Key Facts:

- 9,000 outpatient attendances at the War Memorial Hospital each year
- 54% of patients attending are from the Congleton area
- 100% of patients would recommend the Aston Unit

Mental Health

Mental Health Awareness

Earlier in October, we recognised World Mental Health Day. Cheshire East Council has just produced an All Ages Mental Health Strategy 2019-2022. Visyon has been supporting people's emotional health and well-being for 25 years in Congleton. All good reasons to focus on Mental Health. Thank you to the staff at Visyon for supplying much of the information for this page.

Mental Health Matters

One in four adults are believed to experience a mental health condition each year, making it very likely that everyone knows someone who would benefit from support with their mental health. Like physical illness, mental illness can affect anyone. And just like a physical illness it is important to seek support particularly if you:

- feel sad and worthless
- have lost interest in things that you once enjoyed
- have feelings of worry and panic.

Your General Practitioner (GP) is usually the best place to start. They will be able to provide you with different options of support which may include talking therapies and/or medication. Maintaining good mental health is invaluable to having a feeling of overall wellbeing.

If you suspect a friend, work colleague or family member is suffering, one way you can support them is simply by listening, not interrupting, just letting them talk and responding in a non-judgmental way. Repeating back what someone says to you can also encourage them to keep talking because they will feel that you're genuinely interested in what they have to say.

Visyon is keen for everyone to take a collective responsibility for mental health and build more resilient communities that are better equipped to support each other. This includes workplaces taking better care of employee's wellbeing, schools taking better care of student's wellbeing and everyone becoming more educated about mental health.

Visyon is taking steps to encourage this by;

- working with parents and families through Parent Empower Hour and Family Support sessions
- working in schools to inform teachers how to better support their students
- offering Community Ambassador sessions to train members of the community.

Years of VISYON

2019 see's Visyon mark 25 years of working with children and young people promoting positive mental health and emotional wellbeing. Visyon started as a small charity based in West Street and run by a few skilled volunteers, two of the original founders are still with the organisation. It is now a major provider of services across Cheshire East and North Staffordshire, but maintains its headquarters at Fellowship House, next to the paddling pool in Congleton.

A quarter of a century of support by many

volunteers, young and not so young, has helped to grow and sustain Visyon's work. The journey has not always been smooth as funding was (and still can be) hard to obtain with many funders looking for new projects. Major grants have helped and the charity is thankful to all the local people who have supported it during the first 25 years.

Three FREE Parking Days this Christmas

To make it easier for you to stay longer and enjoy Congleton this Christmas, Congleton will use three of its four 'free' parking days on:

Congleton also benefits from Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs). The PCSOs are often seen out and about and hold a variety of surgeries in their localities. The Town Council sponsors one of the PCSOs, the rest are sponsored by Cheshire East Council.

Messages can also be left for any of the officers at Congleton Police Station in Market Square. The Police Station is staffed Monday - Friday from 9am - 5pm and there is a 24 hour contact phone on the outside of the building.

Congleton Speedwatch Volunteers Needed

Congleton PCSOs work alongside local volunteers to bring Speedwatch to areas in Congleton. Training is given and speedwatch volunteers use equipment to monitor speeds in agreed areas. Details of those breaking the speed limits are passed
