

Town Hall Vaccination Hub

Congleton Town Hall is the vaccination centre for patients from the Congleton and Holmes Chapel doctors' surgeries. Patients are being prioritised in accordance with the Government criteria. The over 80s were the first through the door. 80-year-old Peter Clewlow from Congleton, pictured below, was delighted to receive his injection in week two.

Although the NHS, volunteer helpers and venue are prepared to open for as often and long as possible, the centre can only operate when it has vaccines available. In the first two weeks the centre was operational for four days and the GP practices were able to vaccinate around 2,800 people. This includes people within care homes, older people in residential settings and health and care workers.

As Bear Necessities went to press, the surgeries were hoping to start contacting the over 75s as the next cohort to receive the vaccinations. This will be followed by those aged 70+ and clinically extremely vulnerable people, followed by those aged 65+, adults aged 16-65 with underlying health conditions, all those aged over 60, then 55+, 50+ followed by the rest of the population in an order still to be determined.



The GP practices will contact patients to offer a vaccination. You may be contacted by text, letter or phone call. This is a FREE NHS service. There is no charge for the vaccination. You are asked not to call your GP. They will contact you. For more information on the vaccine see www.nhs.uk/covid-vaccination. Protect Your Community

PLEASE continue to play your part in protecting yourself, your family, your friends, your community and the NHS. The vaccines offer real hope, but even if you have received your vaccination you need to stay safe and continue to follow Government advice on COVID-19.

If you have any of the following symptoms you should get a test and self-isolate with other members of your household:

- A high temperature
- New continuous cough
- Loss of sense of smell or taste

If you are asked by Track and Trace to self-isolate and get a test, you must do so. This is a legal requirement. If you are contacted by someone purporting to be from Track and Trace and you are asked to pay any money, this is a SCAM. Track and Trace will not charge for testing. Congleton Link Road

GRAHAM CONSTRUCTION has reported that great progress has been made across the Congleton Link Road scheme, with the project due to be completed in the Spring. Approximately 5km of the 5.7km of new carriageway has been tarmacked, with road foundation works to be completed on the remaining sections over the coming weeks. Construction of the combined footpath and cycleway along the route is also ongoing.

In October 2020 they began landscaping the area, and to-date, in excess of 2000 new trees have been planted in the new native woodland plots, along with roughly 7000 other species of shrubs and hedgerows. The completion of the tree and shrub planting, along with the creation of approximately 33 hectares of new grassland and 16km of new hedgerows, will help to increase biodiversity, providing an important habitat for wildlife, as well as preventing soil erosion and reducing flooding and pollution in the years to come.



Big Heart Lunch Club!

PEOPLE IN CONGLETON who for a variety of reasons may be struggling to cook a good hearty meal for themselves may be able to receive a meal once a

week to their door, thanks to an extended offer from Congleton's Big Heart Lunch Club. The subsidised club was set up in Spring 2020 to provide a meal for those who would normally attend the Congleton luncheon clubs operating from the United Reformed Church and St John's Community Centre in Buglawton.

Since June 2020 the meals have been prepared by the Old Saw Mill Community Café in Back River Street and delivered by Congleton Town Council on a Friday morning. There is a meat or vegetarian option plus a dessert. The meals arrive chilled ready to be heated up in the microwave or oven. Thanks to some additional funding by Congleton



Inclosure Trust and Cheshire East Community Fund the Big Heart Lunch Club is confident that it can double its offer from around 50 to 100 meals per week. The meals are usually offered at the subsidised cost of £4 per person, although there is some scope for greater help for those most in need.

Cheshire East commits to Congleton Leisure Centre Refurbishment

CHESHIRE EAST COUNCIL (CEC) will begin the refurbishment of the Congleton's Leisure Centre in the spring -subject to obtaining planning approvals- and will then deliver on its promise to provide a modern gym, exercise and swimming facility for the town. The commitment for revised £11 million project was confirmed by CEC in December. The 15-month build project has been awarded to a local contractor and will mean that the centre will have to close for much of the building work. Plans to upgrade the skate park will happen at a later date. The rugby facilities will not be affected.

Domestic Abuse Clinics secured for another year

THANKS to additional funding from the CRH CharitableTrust, My Cheshire Without Abuse will continue to offer weekly Domestic Abuse Advice Clinics in Congleton to provide help, support and guidance. Once a month the clinics will be held in collaboration with specialist domestic abuse officers from Cheshire Police who can provide advice and support in relation to new complaints, Claire's Law disclosures or updates on existing cases.

COVID 19, lockdowns and the impact on the economy is causing additional



pressures on families. My Cheshire Without Abuse (CWA) want to reassure those affected by domestic abuse that they are still able to access help and support and that the team are in the local community and here to help.

As not everyone will want or be able to see the team in person, clinic appointments are also available virtually or by phone. To book an appointment call My CWA 01270 250390. If you feel you are at risk of immediate harm call 999. Cheshire East Domestic Abuse HUB 0300 123 5101 is also available 24/7 for advice.

Be alert to scams

ge UK Cheshire East has partnered with Cheshire East Council's Trading Standards to raise awareness of scams and doorstep crime amongst local older people, as well as providing much needed aftercare for older people who have been victims of such crimes.

Over 50% of the over 65s have been targeted by scammers. This project aims to reduce this number by empowering older people to avoid being victims of scams. Being a victim of a scam can affect quality of life and wellbeing as well as cause anxiety, embarrassments and depression. CAR PARKING AND TRANSPORT PLANS

POST OFFICE FOR THE TOWN

Congleton Town Council continues to explore all the avenues for getting a post office counter service based in the Town Centre. This is proving extremely difficult, and even more so in the current climate. Work continues behind the scenes.

CENOTAPH

Congleton Partnership and Town Council would like to thank everyone who contributed to the Cenotaph Project. The plan is to do an official opening of the site with military and local organisations and dignitaries in September.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The team behind the Neighbourhood Plan continues to make slow progress on redrafting sections of the Neighbourhood Plan. Although the Town Council is still very keen to see the plan progress through to full consultation, focus has needed to be on addressing more immediate matters over the past few months.

TOWN GUIDE

Residents living in CW12 should have received a Town Guide through their door before Christmas. This 82-page booklet has been produced by the Town Council in partnership with the Beartown Voice to help showcase what a great town we live in. GRANTS AVAILABLE

Congleton based charities or not for profit organisations that need additional funds to benefit local people can apply to the Town Council for grants. CONGLETON PRECEPT

From April, the Town Council will increase its precept by 1.99%. This means the average band D property will pay £91.09 per year, or £1.75 per week - 4p per week more than last year. Time and funding resources will be focussed on activities set out in the 2020-2023 Business Plan and helping supporting Congleton through the COVID-19 pandemic.

CONGLETON'S multi award-winning park is 150 years old! The park was officially opened on the 29th of May 1871 and has been enjoyed by thousands over the years! The land between the Town Wood and the River Dane was purchased by the Town Council in 1856. Parks were a matter of public pride in Victorian times and their design was as important as that of public buildings. (The Town Hall was opened in 1866) Congleton Park was designed by Edward Kemp, who had worked under the supervision of Joseph Paxton at Chatsworth. Later Kemp was consulted on the designs for Central Park in New York!

Congleton Park was fully restored in 2004/5. It is owned by Cheshire East Council and

maintained by Congleton Town Council. A Friends of Congleton Park group supports the work in the park, organises regular clean-ups and helps to put on events. More volunteers are always welcome! The Friends also organise summer Sunday concerts in the bandstand, and it is hoped that these may be able to return this summer.

The 150th celebrations started at the end of 2020 when the park was awarded its 13th Green Flag and a Green Heritage Site accreditation for the management of its historic features.
