New Era for Congleton Information Centre

THE newly named Congleton Information Centre is now managed by Congleton Town Council. In a mutually beneficial agreement, the four members of staff who were previously employed by Cheshire East Council have transferred to the Town Council.

The Congleton Information Centre will continue to help residents and visitors make the most of their time in Congleton. The team will sell tickets for local events and theatres, promote places to stay and things to do, sell a limited amount of local produce and literature as well as promote the wider area. The team

will also become the reception for the Town Council and Town Hall and first point of contact for general calls and enquiries. There are also exciting plans to improve the online offer, recognising that not all information needs can be met during the traditional shop opening hours.

Historic day as Congleton Link Road Opens

IT HAS TAKEN just over two years and £90m to build, but the Congleton Link Road, named the Wolstenholme Elmy Way after Congleton's famous pioneering educationalist and Suffragist, is now open for motorists. The road was opened on Monday 19th April, following a weekend where members of the public enjoyed running, walking and cycling along the 5.5km stretch of traffic-free bypass. The opening was marked by a small COVID-19 secure ribboncutting ceremony followed by a Beartown Road Cruise featuring 100 classic cars.

It is anticipated that around half of the 13,000 vehicles using Clayton Bypass each day will now use the new road, making it easier for local people to get in and around Congleton. The new road joins the A534 Sandbach Road to the west and the A536 Macclesfield Road to the north. There are exits off the new road onto the Sandbach, Holmes Chapel, Manchester and Macclesfield roads as well onto Back Lane and Barn Road/Viking Way.

Congleton needs a Household Waste Site

CONGLETON TOWN COUNCIL

remains united in the belief that the growing town of Congleton must have its own Household Waste and Recycling Site. The current popular site, that deals with around 2,783 tonnes per year, will close in September 2021 when Cheshire East Council's lease on the site comes to an end. The nearest Cheshire East Household Waste Sites will then be Macclesfield or Alsager, Cheshire East spent £50,000 on consultants to look at other potential locations for a site for Congleton, but these locations have not been revealed. The Town Council is disputing claims that it would cost about £4 million to replace the site, as other councils are building sites for around £2 million. A Cheshire East Council committee paper which recommended not replacing the Congleton site was



pulled for administrative reasons from April's cabinet meeting and is due to be discussed in May. A petition to Save Our Recycling centre is still open and can be found at www.change.org/p/ cheshire-east-council-save-ourcongleton-recycling-centre. The Town Council remains committed to doing all it can to get a new site for Congleton.

Vaccinations Continue

NHS STAFF and volunteers at the Congleton Town Hall vaccination centre have worked hard over the past three months to vaccinate over 15,000 local people. The focus remains on ensuring that everyone who is eligible is offered a first vaccine and that those who are due a second vaccine receive it within 12 weeks of their first dose. The GP practices are

busy arranging second dose recalls. Invites will be sent by post,



text or phone call. People aged 45 or over can now book their COVID-19 vaccine, the quickest way to arrange an appointment is online using the National Booking Service: www.nhs.uk or by calling 119.

Dementia Friends Gift Pack Project

THE DEMENTIA FRIENDLY Congleton group is working with Congleton Police on a project to distribute gift packs to people living in Congleton who are affected by dementia. This project is possible thanks to funding from Plus Dane Housing, Congleton Rotary, Congleton Town Trust and Congleton Lions and £1000 match funding from the Police Commissioner.

Contact is being made by local GP surgeries inviting patients with dementia, or their carers or family members, to contact Diane Ritherdon, Group Chair, if

they would like to receive a pack. The pack will consist of games and activities, many sourced from the Alzheimer's Society also an activity leaflet as provided by Age UK. All are designed to stimulate memories of earlier times. If someone you know, who lives at home in Congleton, has not received an invitation by the end of April, please contact Diane 07770 724932. The group is hoping to establish a lending/ exchange scheme for activities and games and looks forward to re-starting face to face activities.

TO CELEBRATE the 750th anniversary of the granting of Congleton's first Charter in 1272, Congleton Museum is intending to produce a new history book, based around 100 objects which have a particular resonance with aspects of the town's history. An example might be this arm band (pictured above) bearing the town badge of the lion

standing on the barrel which would have been worn by Corporation officers authorised as they collected the tolls and rents on market days. This reflects the importance the markets and fairs, initiated by the 1272 Charter, played in the commercial growth of the town.
