- 2. Reducing fuel emissions- Streetscape routes have been rationalised to reduce mileage. More eco-friendly vehicles will be considered when the leasing contract is renewed
- 3. Actions to reduce staff and councillor travel though using Zoom meetings and encouraging walking and cyclind where possible
- 4. Actions to reducing Town Hall plastic use, removing all single use plastic where possible
- **5.** Reducing grass cutting- we are currently looking at 13 pilot areas
- 6. Reducing paper use in the Town Hall **7.** Using more eco-friendly cleaning products in the Town Hall
- 8. Local Purchasing- the Town Council purchases and sources locally where possible
- 9. Careful disposal of all waste. No wast from the public bins or Town Hall is sent to landfill
- **10.** Considering ways to off-set the residual carbon footprint

REDUCING WASTE

With the closure of the Congleton Household Waste & Recycling Site in September, Congleton residents are urged to carry on recycling! The Town Council opposed the closure of the site. Our nearest Cheshire East sites will now be Lyme Green in Macclesfield and Alsager.

WHERE CAN YOU RECYCLE?

Could someone make good use of the product that you no-longer require? In Congleton we have six charity shops -League of Friends on Lawton Street, YMCA and Oxfam on the High Street, Northwest Air Ambulance in Market Street, Cancer Research in the pedestrian area, and Mencap and Barnardo's at West Heath Shopping Centre. Some charities have collection bins for clothes and shoes on car parks – Salvation Army on the Fairground Car Park. Donna Louise Trust on West Street Car Park, various at Tesco Car Park. There are also several recycling online platforms such as freecycle, gumtree, eBay, Vinted, Depop.

PADDLING POOL UPDATE

THE TOWN COUNCIL is aware that the delayed opening of the paddling pool has caused disappointment. The delay has largely resulted from health and safety guidance on the operation of chlorinated water pools which was made clear when staff attended a training course on pool operation and maintenance in early June. If we continued as normal, we would have been operating outside of the required guidelines.

A new Normal Operating Procedure (NOP) for the paddling pool was commissioned, which includes procedures and analysis of the pool, the quality of the water, the surrounding area, the equipment, the use and storage of chemicals as well as its management and supervision. In developing this document other issues and areas of concern have arisen, which we are trying to resolve as quickly as possible. In some cases new parts have been required, and delivery times are uncertain.

We have also been told that numbers in the pool area must never exceed 140 people. We realise that this will create an issue as it is half our previous limit and are working to put an effective and fair booking system in place so people know that they can access the pool. Updates will appear on our website and social media.



Working for a Greener Future

The world is experiencing more extreme weather conditions: intense heat, droughts, floods and storms. The polar ice caps are melting. Global temperatures are up by 1.2°C and increasing by 0.2°C per decade. At the same time, the planet is also facing a nature emergency with a million of the nine million species facing extinction.

THE WORLD LEADERS are meeting in Glasgow for COP26 from October 31st - November 12th to draw up binding international treaties and commitments to protect the planet. COP26 stands for Conference of the Parties. Previous conferences have led to the Kyoto Protocol and Paris Agreement.

COP26 aims to:

- Secure global carbon emissions to net zero by mid-century and keep a 1.5 degree temperature rise within reach
- Adapt to protect communities and natural habitats
- Mobilise at least £100bn in climate finance per year
- Work together to save our planet

Both Congleton Town Council and Cheshire East Council has signed a Climate Change Emergency pledge to reduce their carbon footprint to zero by 2025. In this Green Supplement we consider what we are doing and can do in Congleton to play our part in this enormous task.

GIVING NATURE SPACE TO FLOURISH

In the UK our insect populations have suffered drastic declines, which have far reaching consequences for both wildlife and people. With a third of our food crops and as many as 87% of other plants pollinated by insects there is a lot to lose. Much of our wildlife, be it birds, bats, amphibians, small mammals or fish rely on insects for food. Without them we risk the collapse of our natural world.

To help combat this, Congleton Town Council, with support from local people has changed its mowing regimes starting with 13 pilot areas. Instead of mowing fortnightly to keep grass short and reducing flowers and wildlife from flourishing, we will look to add

native wild flowers in the grass and allow it to grow naturally to make it an attractive place for people and wildlife. These areas will be cut twice a year to get rid of dead vegetation and prevent the plants from growing too tall. Residents living near to the 13 pilot areas have been contacted and have **CONGLETON CLIMATE FESTIVAL** been largely supportive.

You can play your part by cutting your grass less frequently and allowing more space for nature.

REDUCING CHEMICAL USE

Following concerns over the effects of Glyphosate weed killer, Congleton Town Council stopped using it in and around 'official' children's play areas managed by the Council's Streetscape team in July 2020. The Town Council no-longer uses Glyphosate in the following areas:

- Grassy areas which are 'unofficial' play areas used by children
- Near schools
- Around trees
- Around street furniture

The Town Council is looking to further reduce the use of Glyphosate in public spaces, footpaths and estates, and are exploring suitable alternative methods of controlling weeds in a planned and effective way.

AND GREEN FAYRE

In the week leading up to COP26 Congleton Town Council and Congleton Sustainability Group are working together to host a Climate Festival. There are already many exciting activities planned for the week – from practical opportunities such as tree planting and apple juicing, to talks, visits, films and guided tours.

The week will end on Saturday 30th October with a Green Fayre held in the closed High Street with stalls and a range of green transport to view. The fayre is from 10am – 4pm.
