| REPORT TITLE | 30 Site-Specific Biodiversity Sites and No Mow May | | |
| Background | At the January Community and Environment Committee, the committee agreed to move forward with appointing a consultant to help create Site-Specific Biodiversity Plans for 30 sites across Congleton. This paper is to update members of the plans for the Site-Specific work and also for the Town Council plans for No Mow May, which is a campaign aimed at helping wildlife and biodiversity. 30 Biodiversity Sites An initial meeting was held on the 10 th March attended by Ruth Benson, the consultant expert on the subject, along with Cllr Margaret Gartside, Cllr Suzy Firkin and Streetscape Development Manager - Ruth Burgess. Congleton Park together with Town Wood - as a Historic England Grade 2 registered park with Local Wildlife Site this area should have its own management plan or plans.

NO MOW MAY

Congleton Streetscape Services provides the grounds maintenance for the parks and many of the green spaces in Congleton under contract to Cheshire East.

Cheshire East has reviewed its Municipal Parks Strategy and as part of the Climate and Nature emergency is encouraging NO MOW May. This also fits with the Town Council's green agenda. No Mow May is a national campaign to let more flowers bloom in May to support bees and other pollinators.

| Environmental | This paper is fundamentally about the Town Council's response to the Climate and Nature emergency and actions to encourage greater Biodiversity in Congleton. | |
