

Congleton Town Mayor - Councillor Denis Murphy



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I was elected to the 'best job in town' via a virtual ceremony on the 6th May 2021, when we were all still very much emersed in a world of COVID-19 restrictions. As the event was via zoom it is still possible to see it via you tube. The election followed a two-year stint as Deputy Mayor as the Council voted to keep the status quo in April 2020 at the start of the Covid pandemic.

Having served as Mayor in 2008/9 and again in 2014/15 I was keen to support the people and businesses of Congleton in this important Civic Role. Due to the COVID-19 restrictions, the start of year was different to other years. The Mayor's parade was delayed until September. Large-scale

community events such as the Congleton Food and Drink Festival were put on hold.

I was delighted that Congleton Pride was able to return in July and thanks to sponsorship by the Town Council the Jazz and Blues Festival took place and was a great success in August. I also thoroughly enjoyed the scaled-back Christmas Lights Switch on and unveiling of the Elizabeth Statue in March. The national and regional in Bloom competitions were judged via portfolio and photographic evidence, rather than a large awards ceremony in Southport, the judges visited individual towns and it was a fabulous and memorable night in the Town Hall when the judges attended an In Bloom thank you night and announced that we had won gold and were the best large town in the North West!



In September it was my absolute pleasure to host a Civic Award Ceremony at the Cricket Club and award and thank around 80 'hidden heroes' for the selfless work and support that they gave to the community throughout the COVID pandemic. I appreciate this was only the tip of the iceberg of people who helped and Congleton is so lucky to have so many caring businesses, groups and individuals.

September also saw the official dedication service for the improved town cenotaph, proudly displaying more than 250 additional names. This project was promoted by the Partnership and received a lot of financial and practical support from the Town Council. The Town Council and Partnership also worked together on an important Green Fayre and Climate Week as the world discussed COP26.

But being Mayor is not all about the mass public events. I have been able to see a lot of our very talented performers in action. I am so impressed with the talent in our town – and also with the dedication and devotion of all those who support them, coach them and work behind the scenes to make things happen in our wonderful town.

I have also been able to speak with and meet many of the wonderful charities, organisations and businesses that do so much for our town. A number of groups have celebrated major milestones, such as 75 years of Rotary, 100 years of Astbury Golf Club and 100 years of Girl Guides. This year marks 750 years since the Town was granted its first town charter by Henry de Lacy. Events started towards the end of my term in office with the Beating of the Bounds and decorating of the town centre. Celebrations will continue through until November.

As Mayor I am also the Chair of the Town Council. From June 2021 the power to make decisions remotely was removed by Government and face to face meetings returned. I would like to thank the staff at the Town Hall and my fellow councillors for the professional way they adjusted to this change whilst still ensuring measures were in

place to keep us all safe.

I would also like to thank everyone who has helped me as Mayor, or the Council as a key organisation, over this past year. It has not been an easy year and many households are still coming to terms with loss or change by COVID-19. We aware that many people in our community are struggling to make ends meet, and we are also welcoming new people from Ukraine that have escaped the war in their country. I would urge everyone to continue to show compassion and look after each other. We are a brilliant community and I have been very proud to be your Mayor over the past year.



How is the Town Council Financed?

The majority of the Town Council's funds come from a Precept which is added to the Council Tax levy set by the Principal Authority, in our case Cheshire East Council. In 2021-2022 the Precept was £954,146. Total cost of Streetscape Services was £611,539 of which £372,888 is funded through the Cheshire East contract. Other income comes via hiring of the Town Hall, Congleton Information Centre sales and grants and sponsorship.

What Services does the Town Council Provide:

Congleton Town Council is one of the largest of the 108 town and parish councils in Cheshire East. The Council was founded in 1980 and became fully operational in April 1981. It provides the most local tier of government for Congleton.

It serves the local community by:

- Providing an essential link between town residents and Cheshire East Borough Council to ensure grassroots views are heard and considered
- Encouraging economic development and regeneration of Congleton
- Examining planning and licensing applications and giving opinions to the Borough Council on behalf of residents
- Managing a range of local services and facilities to benefit Congleton including the Town Hall, street cleansing and grounds maintenance services, paddling pool and cenotaph and provide allotments
- Providing financial support to a variety of community groups and organisations which support the wellbeing of Congleton residents
- Helps safeguard local people through paying for 24/7 monitored CCTV and an extra PCSO
- Organising and supporting events that encourage the community to enjoy and celebrate being part of the Congleton community.

Congleton Town Council covers an area of 2255 hectares (22.55 sq. km or 8.7 square miles) with a population of around 26,900 (figure from the 2011 census).

Since January 2014 the Town Council has delivered Grounds and Cleansing Services for Congleton, via a devolved services agreement with Cheshire East and ANSA.

The Town Council is the accountable body for Congleton Partnership, and provides substantial grants to Congleton Community Projects, Congleton Partnership and Congleton's Citizen's Advice Bureau as well as running a grant scheme for local groups and organisations (see page 8)

Congleton Town Council activities revolve around eight strategic objectives, pages 9-11. The Town Council has 20 elected members based in two wards. Decisions are made via public committees and ratified at Council. The committees are Town Hall and Assets, Community and Environment, Planning, Finance and Policy and Personnel.

More on Streetscapes' work

Congleton Town Council carries out maintenance on ornamental and prestige areas, general amenity areas, public footpaths, sporting areas, recreational areas, rough cut and Conservation Areas. The Town Council no longer uses any glyphosate-based weed killer on grassy areas which are official or unofficial play areas, near schools, around trees or around street furniture and is trialing a new product with no



glyphosate for other areas with the aim to reduce pesticide use as much as possible.

During the year the Streetscape service has started to invest in electrical tools rather than using fuel-based equipment. This is all part of the Town Council's Climate Change commitment to reduce its Carbon Footprint.

The Streetscape team has been helping the Congleton Tree Group with advice on planting and checking areas for planting with Cheshire East Council. Congleton Town Council only carries out minor tree work, other tree work is undertaken by a specialist Arboriculture Team at Cheshire East Council.

- Gaining national coverage for the 750 Charter year celebrations
- · Welcomed the gift of a statue of Elizabeth Wolstenholme Elmy for the Town Centre

- Signed up to a Nature Emergency as well as the Climate Emergency and commissioned site-specific work on 30 sites where Congleton has some influence

Working Groups 2021-22

The Town Council had eight working groups operating in 2021-22 to help develop its work. Working groups are generally proposed by a Town Council Committee when there is a specific subject that would benefit from more in-depth work than can be carried out via a committee. Sometimes working groups co-opt non-council people who have an interest or expertise in the subject to contribute to the group either as a regular member or as a guest to the meeting.

Each working group will generally have its terms of reference. The Working Groups are not decision-making bodies and return their findings to the committee from which it originated.

Unlike committees, working groups are not open to the press or public unless specifically invited. Their minutes, membership and actions can be seen on the Town Council's Website A brief summary of the active Working Groups during the 2020-21 year can be seen below.

750 Working Group - this group was formed in 2021 and has delegated responsibility for organising the CTC led event for the 750-year charter celebrations - Beating the Bounds, Platinum Jubilee Party, Living History Event, Medieval Festival, Medieval Banquet, Beer Festival and Ale Trail and reports to Community and Environment Committee

Anti-Social Behaviour Working Group - this group also includes the Police, Cheshire East Council and Bromley Farm Community Centre - was set up to monitor, address and reduce antisocial behaviour and its underlying causes in Congleton. It also considers Hate Crime, Domestic Abuse and Traffic issues. This Working Group reports to the Community & Environment Committee.

Congleton Green Working Group – this group also includes a few members of the Congleton Sustainability Group. It was established following the Town Council's Climate Change Emergency pledge in September 2019. It is working on a priority list for reducing the carbon footprint of Congleton Town Council activities, based on a baseline data spreadsheet of activities. It is also considering the Nature Emergency and ways to increase biodiversity in Congleton. The group reports to Community and Environment Committee.

Congleton in Bloom Working Group – this is a long-standing Working Group that was set up in 2011 when the previous In Bloom volunteer group wished to retire after 13 successful years. It is made up of councillors, officers and volunteers. The Congleton in Bloom group works alongside many community and youth groups in Congleton, as well as businesses to help make Congleton an attractive, cleaner and greener town. It also coordinates activities around the annual In Bloom and It's Your Neighbourhood competitions. It reports to the Community and Environment Committee.

Congleton Market Working Group – is made up of Councillors, Officers and representatives of Congleton Market and was established to consider the possibility of Congleton Town Council taking over the management and responsibility of Congleton Market, which is owned and managed by Cheshire East Council. The group reports to the Town Hall and Services Committee and finished in March 2022. The matter will now be dealt with through a Strategy Working Group and Council as part of a wider regeneration of the town.

Health and Wellbeing Working Group - this Working Group lobbies for adequate Primary Health Care facilities that relate to the growth of the town and to develop and promote initiatives or events relating to improving physical and mental health within Congleton. During COVID-19 it was not possible to work with the NHS on actions other than COVID-19 and this group will now re-establish. It reports to Community and Environment Committee.

Integrated Transport Working Group – this group has been considering the Local Transport Development Plan, ways to improve public transport in Congleton, infrastructure needs to make walking and cycling around Congleton safer. Most of the projects rely on large amounts of funding from CEC or central government. Unfortunately CEC was not able to attract any of the national funding for improved buses. The group reports to the Community and Environment Committee.

Streetscape Development Working Group - this working group considers ways to improve the work of the Streetscape Services for the residents of Congleton whilst ensuring the team are meeting the quality standards set and working within Health and Safety Guidelines. The group reports to the Town Hall and Assets Committee.

Town Hall Development Working Group - this working group considers operational matters to improve the fabric or operations in the Town Hall. It reports to the Town Hall and Assets Committee.

White Ribbon Working Group - This group promotes White Ribbon values and behaviours to end male violence against women. The Town Council received White Ribbon accreditation in November 2019. The White Ribbon charity works with men and boys to challenge those male cultures that lead to harassment, abuse and violence. Congleton Town Council wishes to end all harassment, abuse and violence. The group reports to the Community and Environment Committee.

Climate Change and Nature Emergency

Congleton Town Council declared a Climate Change Emergency on the 19th September 2019. It pledged to reduce the carbon footprint of the town council's activities and operations to net zero by 2025. The Town Council is also considering the nature emergency with proactive plans to improve biodiversity in 30 areas that is has some influence over in the town

A baseline report was conducted by Dr Barry Speed from the Congleton Sustainability Group based on the Town Council's purchasing and energy bills.



Headline Figures are now available for 2018-2019,

2019- 2020, 2020-2021. The baseline figure for 2018-19 was 231,000kg of CO2 or 231 tonnes. The Green Working Group of the Town Council believes it should be possible to reduce emissions by 90,000kg which would leave a residue of 131,000kg that would need to be off-set

Main areas that The Town Council can have a direct impact on are:

- Electric use in the Town Hall
- Gas use in the Town Hall
- Cleaning Chemicals for the Town Hall
- Lease of Vehicles
- Work-related transport costs
- Plant and compost purchasing
- Streetscape chemical use
- Councillor and Staff Travel
- Paddling Pool management
- Town Council plastic use

Other policies are being put in place to ensure that our purchasing polices are as green as possible and that we reduce the quantity of paper used.

Key Priorities for 2022/23

- Introduce active measures to support the Town Council's Climate Change Emergency and nature emergency pledges to reduce the Town Council's carbon footprint and to increase biodiversity in our town
- Organise events and promotions to celebrate the town's 750 charter year celebrations
- Lobby to get CEC to change the boundaries so that the new houses within the Link Road form part of Congleton rather than the rural parishes - alternatively work with the parish councils to achieve a compromise position that will ensure plans to improve services for all can be met.
- Work with health providers to ensure the physical and mental health of residents can be treated locally
- Prepare for the changes brought about by the Local Boundary and Governance Review which introduces five wards for Congleton
- Market Congleton Town Hall and the new commercial partner and work together to reduce the cost of the Town Hall to the precept payers
- Help the Ukrainians who are escaping the war in their country to settle in Congleton and the surrounding areas
- Continue to develop the Streetscape Services and generate income to help off-set costs and maintain the high level of service that the town expects
- To help residents to understand the role of a councillor and encourage them to get involved in the Town Council elections in May 2023
- Make sure that the Congleton Neighbourhood Plan is fit for purpose and one that local people will want to support at Referendum
- Support the development of high quality indoor and outdoor recreational facilities.
- Improve the marketing of the town as a great place to live, work, visit and do business
- Continue supporting the Domestic Abuse Clinic in Congleton
- Obtain Gold in the National Britain in Bloom competitions


